NEWS from NCDA

Tuesday March 3, 2015

The past couple of weeks, North Carolina has experienced the brunt of winter with low temperatures, freezing rain, sleet and snow. Spring should be arriving soon. The NCDA Seed Lab has been very active in testing seed to have available for the spring planting. The North Carolina Seed Industry from the growers, to the processors and the retailers will use the NC Seed Lab to get germination and purity tests for labeling containers of seed.

The updated information is a requirement for the labeling of seed so that the consumer can make a decision about what they are purchasing. High germination and purity percentages on the label along with a more current testing date, will help to determine the quality of the seed.

The NC Seed Lab tests all kinds and varieties of vegetable seeds, grass seeds and various seeds for field crops. They can also test growing tall fescue for the presence of Endophyte fungus, which can be detrimental to brood mares during gestation.

During the 2014 calendar year for both service and official samples there were 15,155 individual tests performed.

The NC Seed Lab has a staff who have both the knowledge and experience in seed analyzing. So please contact them at 919-707-3736 if they can be of service to you.

NC FARMERS INTEND TO PLANT MORE CORN, LESS COTTON & TOBACCO IN 2015*

- * Corn plantings are expected to total 870,000 acres in 2015, up 4% from 2014.
 - * Cotton growers intend to plant 375,000 acres in 2015, down 19% from last year.
 - * Flue-cured tobacco growers expect to harvest 175,000 acres in 2015, down 9% from 2014.
 - * Burley tobacco growers expect to harvest 1,300 acres in 2015, down 7% from last year.
 - * Soybean plantings, remained unchanged from 2014 at 1.75 million acres.
 - * Peanut growers intend to plant 94,000 acres in 2015, unchanged from the planted acreage in 2014.
 - * Sweet potato growers intend to plant 75,000 acres, up 2,000 from last year.
 - * Hay producers expect to cut 850,000 acres in 2015, up 2% from 2014.
 - * Winter wheat plantings totaled 750,000 acres, down 10% from last year.
- *Planting intentions as of March 1. Actual plantings may change based on weather, input costs, commodity prices, etc. and will be reflected in the Acreage report released June 30.

"State of NCCIA"

A review of 2014 Crop Improvement activities revealed some interesting trends. Crop Improvement inspected approximately 111,000 acres this year, approximately 25% more than last year. The five largest inspected seed crops are the same as last year; soybeans, small grains, peanut, turf and sweetpotato in order of descending acreage. The increase in inspections was mainly due to additional soybean and sweetpotato seed acres in NC. Sweetpotato seed acres were driven by increased consumer demand, 'Covington' licensing requirements, increased exports, and expansion of sweetpotato GAP programs. Southeastern US soybean seed acre increases were driven by relatively high commodity prices and the introduction of new Group VI and VII varieties.

Crop Improvement derives its income from inspection and tagging fees. Total inspection fees increased by 37% while tag fees declined 21% since 2011 making this the first year that inspection fees surpassed tagging fees. This trend is echoed across all state seed certifying agencies; seed production remains high but seed certification steadily declines; we do not expect this trend to change anytime soon. Despite declines in certification participation, we were able to fund \$57,000 in NCSU research projects and upgrade one vehicle. Research funding was allocated to turf, peanut, and small grains breeding programs and the Micro-Propagation and Repository Unit (MPRU). To maintain or increase the level of 2014 inspections, Crop Improvement is in need of a few part-time inspectors for 5-6 weeks in the fall; any volunteers would be appreciated.

The peanut breeding program received the lion's share of our project funding in the form of partial funding toward the purchase of a SeedMeister near-infrared scanner (NIR). The SeedMeister is designed to provide rapid non-destructive Fatty Acid profiling. The SeedMeister will allow the peanut breeder to quickly identify high-oleic breeding lines and peanut seed companies to screen their lots for the high-oleic trait. Rapid Fatty Acid profiling may become important to the soybean seed producers if/when high-oleic soybeans become a bigger part of the Southeastern US soybean market. Tom Isleib's new high oleic varieties, 'Wynne' and 'Sullivan', are

undergoing seed expansion this year allowing growers to become familiar with these varieties.

NC Crop Improvement hosted the Association of Official Seed Certifying Agencies (AOSCA) in Asheville this past summer; North Carolina last hosted this meeting 39 years ago. Over 150 association delegates from all over the world attended this annual conference. The NC seed industry was well represented by displaying Ag products unique to NC; including, live tobacco/cotton/sweetpotato/elite strawberry plants, sweetpotato products, tobacco leaves, oilseed samples, small grain derived products, peanut products. Several NC Seedsmen contributed to the success of this meeting; thank you for your support. A substantial portion of the delegates had never seen some of our products before and expressed great interest in our seed industry. We were also able to amend AOSCA turf and tobacco standards to align more closely with NC seed production practices. High-oleic peanut seed certification standards became the biggest issue of the conference. The concern was - can we keep the high-oleic Virginia type varieties separate and free of mixtures with normal oleic peanuts? Texas, Florida, Mississippi, and Georgia are struggling to keep their high-oleic runner and Valencia high-oleic peanut pure especially since the market is dominated by normal oleic peanuts. Our hope is that the SeedMeister NIR scanner will help the peanut seed industry maintain purity by quickly screening high oleic seed at a reasonable cost.

Seed quality and supply is good to excellent depending on your crop of interest. A few items may be in short supply this year. Warm season turf inventory may be low attributable to last year's winter kill, relatively high market demand for drought resistant varieties, and slow regrowth. Sweetpotato seed supply is almost exhausted; most seed producers have pre-sold their G1 and G2 roots. The variety 'Covington' still dominates the sweetpotato market; although, growers are continually searching for a replacement to reduce their reliance on one variety. Two new NCSU and several new LSU varieties are being extensively trialed this year. There is much to learn about these varieties before you significantly modify your varietal mix.

We are continually answering questions regarding replanting of farmer saved seed. Our answers are falling on deaf ears or farmers are just ignoring us; I believe the

latter. I believe we are seeing a resurgence in the use of farmer saved seed particularly in the small grains market due to falling commodity prices. We continue to point out that most varieties are protected by PVP Title V, utility patents, bag licenses, or some combination of seed protection. We estimate that 90% of modern commercially available varieties are protected by some form of patent or license making it illegal for a farmer to save and replant seed. Enforcement of PVP is the responsibility of USDA, NCDA, and to a lesser extent NCCIA. Patents and license enforcement is mainly the seed company's responsibility. Crop Improvement can help by communicating with USDA, NCDA, and/or the offending grower; however, proof of infringement must be submitted to the USDA and NCDA before they act. At our annual meeting this winter in Raleigh, Mark Henry presented a summary of the Farmers Yield Initiative (FYI), which specializes in protecting intellectual property rights of the seed owners. They are particularly active in the Northern Plain states and have been effective in educating growers about the benefits of supporting new variety development, benefits of state certification programs, and the risks of ignoring seed protection. Farmers Yield Initiative can support public institutions and private companies alike through enforcement of variety protection without exposing the intellectual property rights holder to negative publicity.
